



LIGHT grant Narrative for the \$1650 grant award to Camp Watcha Wanna Do:

WHAT NEED WILL THIS PROGRAM ADDRESS AND WHAT ARE THE EXPECTED RESULTS?

Camp Watcha-Wanna-Do is a place that children surviving cancer can go to have fun, be themselves, feel normal and be a kid! They are supported by their peers and counselors who understand exactly what they are living day to day. CWWD allows the parents a break from daily care-giving and gives the siblings a place where they fit in, are seen and understood. All of these kids are amazing and these families are extremely resilient but they both deserve a break from their daily normal of battling the awful disease of cancer. Camp helps children and their families cope with the mental and emotional aspects of potentially life-limiting illnesses. We help them navigate the minefield of childhood cancer that is ever-changing.

Our program is the only Indiana oncology camp offered free to families and the only camp based in Northern Indiana serving young cancer survivors. Campers have the opportunity to participate in a variety of skills classes of their choosing, including water sports, culinary arts, archery, crafts, drama, horseback riding and team-building. Nurses are equipped to provide treatment outside of the usual hospital walls, while campers continue to do what they "wanna do" as campers, not patients! Children may attend camp while in treatment and throughout management of long-term effects of cancer treatment.

The other impactful aspect to our program is that the campers who age out can come back as counselors to help the younger campers. This helps the younger campers see the past campers give back as well as know that they made it despite medical hardship when they were younger. It is a great built in mentoring system. The average % of past campers who come back as counselors has been over 75% post COVID. In 2023, only 4 of the 25 counselors had no previous attendance at camp as a camper. The other life-changing part of our program is the excitement by the kids; there have been years where we have applications for the next year's camp two days after camp has ended. Their enthusiasm is contagious and makes for a happy, motivated board of directors and volunteers.

The results that I expect are more happy kids and families. This week is said to be the best week of the year by both the kids and their families. I expect smiles and laughter and inner strength and tears and emotions and confidence to shine all week by our kids who can do what they wanna do and challenge themselves to be better than their cancer. Studies also show positive outcomes for the power of nature, strong support systems and their healing qualities. We immerse these kids in nature surrounded by a support system that understands exactly what they are going through whether they are a cancer patient or sibling.

WHAT DO I WANT TO DO?

I want to be able to send three Wells County kids to camp in 2024; these kids can then experience all of the really impactful things that camp provides. With the grant to send these three kids, we can spend that money saved on other kids, more programming and more opportunities for our amazing kids. Why three? This number is not random but is the number of children that have attended from Wells County the past years.

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WHAT IS OUR TIMELINE?

We start planning for camp in the January preceding camp in June. This planning committee decides on the theme, evening/day programming, shirt design, manages all of the donations for the week of camp, figures out meals, plans Kinder Camp, provides skills classes, staffs/plans projects for the art barn and works closely with the Camp Potawatomi YMCA staff to provide the best week we can for our kids. We plan for one week of camp from January thru June; six months of camp planning fun! Applications for campers start coming in around January online and then more in February/March after we send out the paper applications via US mail.

Camp Watcha-Wanna-Do Information

MISSION STATEMENT:

"Providing recreational opportunities and support for those children, and their families, surviving cancer"

BELIEF:

"It is our belief that all people, regardless of their individual circumstances, flourish through recreational activities."

HISTORY:

Camp Watcha-Wanna-Do, Ltd. is an independent 501 (C) (3) not-for-profit Indiana corporation serving adolescent cancer survivors in Northeastern Indiana and the surrounding areas. A volunteer Board of Directors, comprised of working professionals from the region, administers the organization in addition to developing and implementing our programs with the assistance of additional community volunteers. All of our programs are provided at no cost to the families and funded entirely by community support. We have never turned a camper away.

The concept for Camp Watcha-Wanna-Do began in 1991 as several people came together to find an outlet for area children with cancer or a brain tumor. Our first summer camp was held in June of 1992 with 38 children. In less than three years, over 100 children spent one week in June hiking, swimming

and playing without the worries of cancer. We continue to average about 110 children each camp week comprised of cancer patients/survivors and their siblings.

PROGRAMS:

All programs are medically supervised; we have a "med shed" which is staffed around the clock with volunteer pediatric oncology nurses. When needed, a pediatric hematologist/oncologist is available and children may receive their medical treatment at camp as appropriate. All children must be cleared by their doctor to attend camp and participate in activities. All counselors and staff receive additional training to best meet the special needs of the cancer patients.

Resident Camp:

A week long camp for children, ages 7 through high school graduation, with a focus on skill development and overall achievement. Campers have the opportunity to try many camp activities and develop new skills by participating courses of their own choice. Campers make new friends and experience new activities such as: archery, boating, crafts, dance, drama, a high-ropes course, hiking, music, swimming, team-building and other special events.

Kinder Camp:

This is a camper's first step into the camp experience, with a one day adventure at camp. We provide a safe, comfortable and fun program for our youngest campers (ages 2-7). Our staff guides campers throughout the day with a caring approach and individual attention. This fun program, loaded with traditional camp activities, prepares a child for a full week of camp in the future.

Other Programs and Partnerships with other organizations:

- We work closely with Cancer Services of Northeast Indiana, Parkview Oncology Children's Clinic, The Affiliates, Tin Caps/Parkview Field and The Community Foundation of Greater Fort Wayne.
- There are several local businesses (i.e. Indiana Auto Auction, Preferred Auto,
 Christopher James Menswear, Casa Restaurants, Anytime Fitness-Georgetown) and nonprofit groups (i.e. Appleseed Quilters Guild, RSVP group in Auburn, Elkhart Optimist
 Club, Tri Kappa) who partner with us and donate to us throughout the year in various
 capacities.
- We also hold two bigger fundraisers (Golf outing in June and Gala in the winter) and several smaller ones throughout the year to help us raise funds for camp as it is free for all campers and their siblings.

PEOPLE SERVED:

Our main focus is serving children who have or have had cancer or a brain tumor. Children with a terminal illness usually cannot play sports or attend camp due to medical restrictions, but with a volunteer medical staff available at all times these children have the opportunity to attend summer camp like many other healthy children. We accept children from all over the state of Indiana, Western

Ohio, Northern Kentucky, Southern Michigan and Eastern Illinois. If they can get to/from camp and are surviving cancer they do not get turned away, even if not from one of the surrounding states.

DISTINCTIONS:

In 2023, Camp Watcha-Wanna-Do, Ltd. celebrated its 32nd summer camp program with a Lego theme – Building HOPE brick by brick. Our 2024 theme is Space – One small step for camp, one giant leap for cancer!

Camp Watcha-Wanna-Do, Ltd. is a long-standing member of Children's Oncology Camping Association International (COCA-i), which allows for networking and program expansion opportunities and helps in providing a safe and memorable experience for campers. Additionally, our organization is accredited by the Better Business Bureau of Northern Indiana.

HOW WILL THE FUNDS BE USED?

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The \$1650 grant will be used to send the three children that attend from Wells County to camp for the week. It costs about \$550 for each child to attend camp; this is the approximate cost of the rental of the campground, food and programming costs per person for the week.
